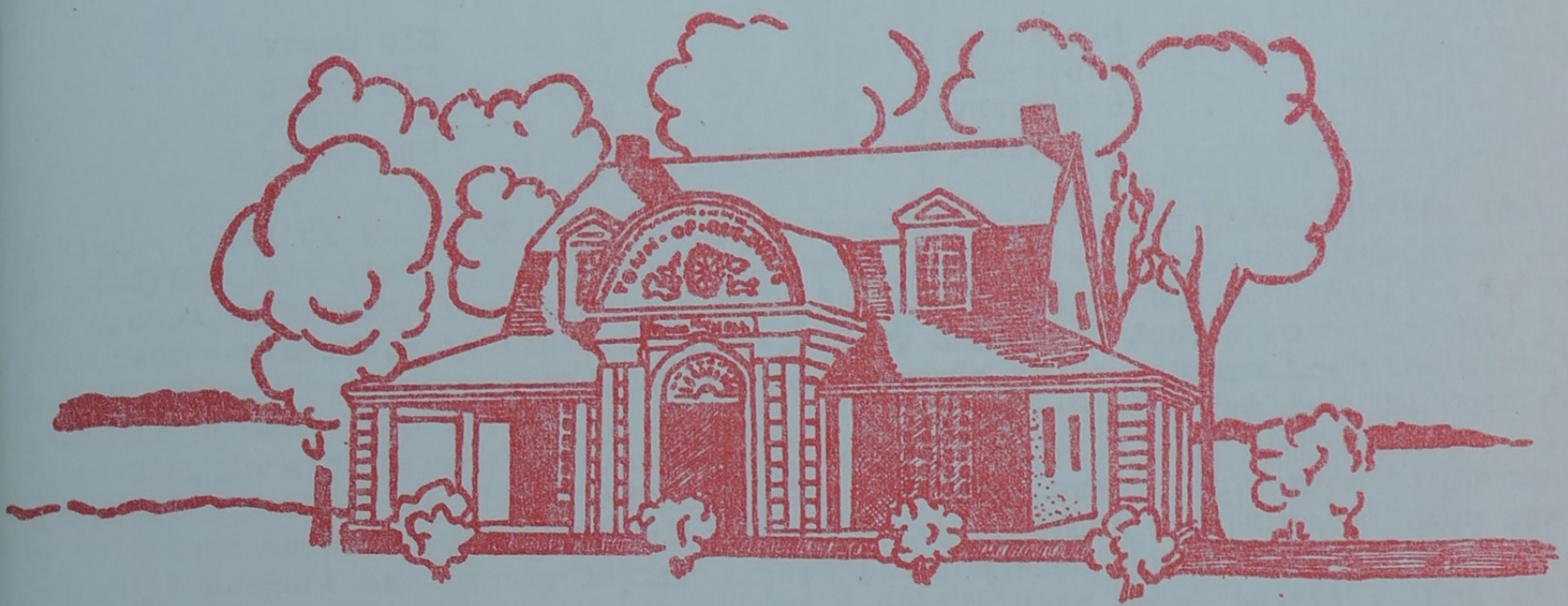

SUNDAY SCHOOL

As a result of our questionnaire sent out with our last issue of "News & Views", only eleven replies were received on the forms and five telephone calls. On sorting out the age groups it appears that we have the following children whose parents are interested in Sunday School.

making a total of 21. Of these only 11 would prefer Sunday School in the Town Hall. In studying this list it is obvious that we do not have enough children of suitable age groups to warrant the formation of a Sunday School in the Town Hall. There will be a general discussion on this matter at the next meeting.

THE RECORD

Our monthly meeting took place at the Town Hall on October 14th. The Chairman, Dr. Cruickshank asked that business be kept to a minimum owing to the long programme expected. Mr. & Mrs. Munro and Mr. & Mrs. Johnstone were introduced to the meeting. The recreation committee announced plans for the Barn Dance on November 4th and asked that suitable clothing be worn, a prize being given for the best lady's costume and a door prize for a lady arriving before 8.30 p.m. The charge will be \$1.00 per couple. Mr. Osborne reported that owing to little interest being shown in Tree Planting, the scheme will be dropped till next spring. The chairman reported that Dr. Dawson had been appointed chairman of the Town Planning Committee to replace Dr. Hanson who had resigned owing to pressure of work. Regarding the proposed increase in railway rates it was decided to send a letter of protest to the Railway Control Board. From the Town Council Mr. Parker announced that the provincial roads department had been asked to provide proper signs throughout the town in an effort to stop speeding. He also announced that owing to a deficit in last year's operating accounts and an expected increase for road repairs, etc. this year, there would be a rise in the mill rate of another $\frac{1}{2}$ mill. After the business Dr. Hanson introduced Miss Jaques, Art Director from Macdonald College, as the guest speaker for the evening.
